- O As oral assessment is conducted over a span of 3 days, your child will be allowed to take his/her oral assessment within the period of assessment.

# Subject-Based Banding (SBB)

### Why introduce Subject-Based Banding?

- O Every child is unique and has different aptitudes, capabilities and talents.
- To recognise the different abilities of students
  - OProvide more flexibility in subject combinations for students with strengths and abilities that vary across subjects

# What Subject-Based Banding means for your child

- OGreater flexibility in subject combinations
- Your child has the choice to take a combination of standard and foundation subjects, depending on his strengths

### What are the choices available?

For P4 exam, If your child	Your child may be recommended to take
Passes all 4 subjects and performs very well in MTL	4 standard subjects + Higher Mother Tongue Language
Passes all 4 subjects	4 standard subjects
Passes 3 subjects	<ul> <li>4 standard subjects; or</li> <li>3 standard subjects + 1 other foundation subject</li> </ul>
Passes 2 subjects or less	<ul> <li>4 standard subjects; or</li> <li>3 standard subjects + 1 other foundation subject; or</li> <li>2 standard subjects + 2 other foundation subjects; or</li> <li>1 standard subject + 3 other foundation subjects; or</li> <li>4 foundation subjects</li> </ul>

# How does Subject-Based Banding Work?

#### [At P4]

School recommends subject combination, based on P4 exam results. Parents indicate preferred combination.



[At P5]

Student takes subject combination chosen by parents

### How does Subject-Based Banding Work?

[End of P5]

Student who takes 1 or more foundation subject(s) and does very well in them	Student who takes standard subjects and has difficulty coping	All other students
School may allow him to upgrade 1 or 2 subjects to standard level if school believes he can cope; or continue the same subject combination in P6	School may allow him to take 1 or more subjects at foundation level in P6	School will allow them to continue the same subject combination in P6

# Subject-based Banding and Secondary School admission

- Progression to secondary level depends on Revised PSLE Scoring System.
  - O Different expectations of standard and foundation subjects will be taken into account
- Offering weaker subjects at foundation level is not a disadvantage.
  - O Your child will be able to focus on building up strong fundamentals in the weaker subjects

# Parental Option

- OSchool recommends P5 subject combination for students to study, based on the Primary 4 End-of-Year Examination results.
- O Parents indicate their choice for the type of subject combination shortly after the release of the Primary 4 End-of-Year Examination results (in Middle of November).

# Allocation of Pupils after P4 (P5 2023)

- Two main blocks of two classes each based on their English and Mathematics assessment data
- O Randomly allocated into the classes within each block
- Smaller range of ability among the students within a class
- Targeted support during their upper primary years




#### WHAT IS THE INTENT OF THE PSLE?




A useful checkpoint at the end of primary school

A fair way to determine secondary school posting



- Reducing fine differentiation of students' examination results at a young age.
- Recognising a student's level of achievement, regardless of how his/her peers have done.
- Encouraging families to choose secondary schools holistically based on students' strengths, interests and abilities.

#### HOW THE PSLE SCORING SYSTEM WORKS



#### FROM T-SCORE TO SCORING BANDS

### a) Reduces fine differentiation of students' examination results at a young age

 Students with similar scores in each subject are grouped into wider scoring bands measured in 8 ALs.

#### b) Reflects a student's individual level of achievement

 Students' ALs for each subject reflect their level of achievement, rather than how they have performed relative to their peers.

#### **GRADING OF FOUNDATION SUBJECT GRADES**

- Foundation subject grades are graded in scoring bands from <u>AL A to C</u>.
- To derive a student's overall PSLE Score for S1 Posting, AL A to AL C for Foundation level subjects are mapped to AL 6 to AL 8 of Standard level subjects respectively.
- Similar to the PSLE T-score system, this mapping is based on the learning and assessment load of the subjects, and informs students of how ready they are for the curriculum in secondary school.

# 4 SUBJECT ALS WILL BE ADDED TO FORM THE OVERALL PSLE SCORE

- The PSLE Score can range from 4 to 32, with 4 being the best.
- Students are placed in secondary school courses based on their PSLE Score – Express, Normal (Academic) or Normal (Technical).

# ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR HIGHER MOTHER TONGUE LANGUAGE (HMTL)

#### **ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR HMTL**

(i) An overall PSLE Score of 8 or better

or

- (ii) An overall PSLE Score of 9 to 14 (inclusive); and attain
  - AL 1 / AL 2 in MTL or
  - Distinction / Merit in HMTL
- The eligibility criteria for taking HMTL takes reference from past criteria.
- It ensures students can cope with the higher academic load.
- Secondary schools continue to have the flexibility to offer HMTL to students who do not meet the criteria if they:
  - have high ability and interest in MTL, and
  - are able to cope with the learning load required.

# ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR MOTHER TONGUE LANGUAGE (MTL) 'B' IN SECONDARY SCHOOLS

• The MTL 'B' curriculum is designed to help students in the Express and N(A) courses who face exceptional difficulty coping with MTL.

# ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR MTL 'B' (FOR STUDENTS OFFERED THE EXPRESS OR N(A) COURSE)

AL 7 or 8 in Standard MTL

<u>or</u>

AL B or C in Foundation MTL


- Schools have discretion to offer MTL 'B' to students who face exceptional difficulty with MTL but do not meet the eligibility criteria at Secondary 1 based on PSLE results.
- As students progress in secondary school, they may also take up MTL 'B' if they are assessed to be suitable by their schools.

#### **TIPS FOR PARENTS!**

Be open and flexible when discussing your child's preferences, needs and choices.

Manage your own expectations and do not project these expectations onto your child.

Have regular conversations with your child to understand more about his/her interests and aspirations.



Affirm your child and offer support when he/she shares his/her plans with you.

### **Direct School Admission (DSA)**

- O DSA-Sec Exercise introduced in 2004 as part of MOE's move towards creating more flexibility and options.
- O To encourage more schools to recognise talents
- O Participating schools will decide on their own admission criteria.

### **Participating Schools**

- O For schools offering an integrated programme (IP Schools) e.g. National junior College
- For independent schools (IS)
- For autonomous schools (AS)
- For schools with niche programmes approved by MOE (Niche Schools)
- O Specialist schools not run by MOE
